

Kentucky Coffeetree Gymnocladus dioicus Fabaceae

Description

Similar to Chickory root, a tea from the roasted seeds was consumed by Native Americans and was used by settlers as a coffee alternative. In the winter, the large seed pods hang from the tree and rattle in the wind. It was also a favorite food of pleistocene megafauna (mammoths and ground sloths) and was much more abundant because of their ability to disperse the seeds after eating them.
