

American Linden or Basswood

Tilia americana Malvaceae

Description

Ameircan trees are native to Minnesota and are often planted on boulevards along streets. They are one of the last trees to produce flowers in the spring and early summer. The flowers are waxy and have a sweet fragrance to them. They can be picked and used fresh in tea similar to chamomile. Honey from this trea is also highly sought after. The tree can also be tapped in the spring to produce syrup similar to Maple syrup. Some hollowed out lindens found in forests can be full of honey!
