## **Description**

The Paper Birch is native to North Dakota. Its bark has been used to make canoes, buckets, and as a paper substitute. Like Maples, its sap can be boiled down to make birch syrup. The leaves, shoots, and catkins can also be eaten cooked or raw. They prefer to grow in moist sites such as along rivers and lakes.
