

Tamarack, American Larch

Larix laricina

Description

The Tamarack or American Larch is the only native deciduous conifer tree in North America. In spring, its bare branches will produce soft, lime colored tufts of needles that grow to be roughly 1" long and dark green. In the fall, the needles turn a gorgeous golden-orange and drop off the tree, leaving small cones haging again from bare branches.
