

Colorado Blue Spruce
Picea pungens

Description

Colorado Blue Spruce is native to the Rocky Mountains in Colorado and Utah. It gets its blue color from a waxy, powdery layer found on the needles. If the color fades, it's likely due to pest activity wearing the layer away. It provides habitat to birds, small mammals, and even butterflies. The sap from the tree is analgesic and has been used as makeshift bandages, similar to superglue. Tea can be made from the needles, younger ones being most sought after, and contain a high amount of vitamin C.
