

Golden Willow Salix alba vitellina Salicaceae

Description

The Golden Willow is a weeping willow native to North America. It grows in moist conditions such as along rivers banks and lake shores. It grows quickly, producing yellow branches that color the winter landscape. Due to their fast growth rate, their branches are weak. They tend to break and lose branches more often than other trees. People commonly consider these to be a messy but beautiful tree.
