

Amur Maple Acer ginnala Sapindaceae

Description

The Amur Maple is a great choice for small gardens or large containers due to it's size and hardiness in cold climates. Though fine in urban settings, it may become invasive, displacing understory in wooded areas and shading out native plants in prairies. Seeds edible and best eaten when small and green, before they turn brown. After peeling off the papery wing, cooking by roasting or boiling is recommended to remove any possible bitterness.
