

Ohio Buckeye

Aesculus glabra

Description

A native tree to North America, the Ohio Buckeye is an excellent ornamental shade tree. It produces large panicles of yellow flowers in the late spring and early summer which ripen into large seed pods containing what are often called Horse Chestnuts. In the fall it turns a bright red orange before losing its leaves.
